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## About Indian Social Responsibility Network (ISRN)

Indian Social Responsibility Network (ISRN) is a not-for-profit multi-dimensional facilitation network in the domain of Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) and sustainable development in India. Registered under the Indian Trusts Act of 1882, ISRN was founded with a philosophy of 'Relationship building, beyond funding' and a vision to facilitate the effective channelization of efforts, skills, resources and outreach of the corporate, Voluntary Organizations (VOs) and the Government, to contribute to the overall development of Indian society.

### Evolution of ISRN

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During 2014, two important events were held on Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) organized by Rambhau Mhalgi Prabodhini (RMP) in February and July that successfully brought together major stakeholders to brainstorm on how the potential of the Corporate CSR could be maximum to contribute to the development

agenda in India. It is in these events that a strong need for a bridge to connect the major stakeholders of the development sector was felt.

Consequently, ISRN was founded as a network with an idea to fill the skill and knowledge gaps to facilitate VOs and Corporate in the implementation of CSR activities for contributing to the development in India. The scope for ISRN's interventions was subsequently broadened to facilitate government – VO collaboration for development through government programs.

### Vision

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India to become a developed nation through joint efforts of four major stakeholders of sustainable development i.e. Corporate, Government, Voluntary Organizations and the Community.

### Mission

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To facilitate synchronization of efforts between the stakeholders in

development viz. corporate, government, voluntary organizations and the community for sustainable development of the nation through leveraging and strengthening the CSR initiatives and government development programs.

### ISRN Intervention Strategy

To achieve this, ISRN's **multi-pronged intervention strategy** includes:

- Advocacy through facilitation of platforms for corporates, VOs and government to deliberate on key CSR/developmental issues.
- Building understanding of Corporates and VOs on CSR.
- Enabling VOs to participate in CSR/government programs by improving their capacities through training and capacity building.
- Filling the existing information gap.
- Facilitate corporates-VO and government-VO collaboration

and convergence on CSR/government programs.

- Providing project life cycle support services to corporate in their CSR activities.
- Monitoring and evaluation of CSR and development projects.

### ISRN Services

ISRN primarily works with the corporate, VOs, government in the area of CSR and government development project. To these stakeholders, ISRN provides the following services:

### ISRN Membership Network

ISRN membership is open to Corporate and VOs. The memberships bring the advantages of knowledge, networking and resources that help corporate meet their CSR objectives and statutory obligations under Companies Act easily and efficiently, while making resources available to VOs.

ISRN has about 100 directed members in 15 states in India. Indirectly, more than 600 VOs and corporates are associated with ISRN across 28 states. ISRN associated VOs are engaged with the socially, economically and geographically disadvantaged in areas such as education, skill development for enhanced employability, livelihoods, health, women

empowerment and environment, among others. In addition, ISRN has a rich pool of empaneled experts on activities listed under Schedule VII1 of the Companies Act of 2013.

### **ISRN Journey So Far**

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Since its inception in July 2014, ISRN has engaged with the corporate, VOs and the government on CSR/ government projects. Some of the key interventions are as follows:

- Environment Study in Rajasthan with Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEFCC), Government of India
- Facilitated participation of VOs in the “**Jan Aushadhi Scheme**” of the Ministry of Chemical and Fertilizers, GOI
- Orientation Program on “**Strategies for Result Oriented Corporate Social Responsibility**” organized for corporate in Indore district. Attended by more than 150 professionals from corporate, PSUs and VOs
- **Capacity Building Program on NGO Management** – Build capacities of 54 VO representatives on areas such as financial management, proposal writing, CSR, documentation and communication, among others

- Organized seminar on “**CSR for Shreshtha Bharat**” attended by representatives of more than 170 Corporate & VOs
- Seminar on **Nation First – CSR – Building Relationship beyond funding**, Bangalore participated by more than 80 VOs & Corporate
- **National Convention on CSR – Mumbai**. Participated by more than 150 Corporate & VOs.

## Brief of ISRN Activities: 2014 – 15

ISRN's journey started in July 2014. Since then till the end of the financial year, ISRN engaged with all the stakeholders viz. corporate, government ministries, CSR networks, industry networks and VOs through a variety of interventions. Significantly, not only these interventions established ISRN as an CSR network, its ability to mobilize VOs improved its relationship with the different ministries in the government.

These interventions were instrumental in bringing the CSR stakeholders on a common platform to discuss ways to improve effectiveness of the CSR interventions, as facilitating VOs participation in ministry's programs. ISRN also made efforts on increasing its membership among the corporate and the VOs, as well as its outreach among other VOs in different states.

A brief of the key activities during the period is provided below:

## National Seminar on Nation First – CSR – Building Relationships Beyond Funding

Successful completion of National Convention on CSR “Relationship Building Beyond Funding” at Rambhau Mhalgi Prabodhini, Mumbai on 15–16 February 2014, the idea reflected by



the participants was the need of development of a forum facilitating NGOs & Corporates for effective implementation of their CSR activities.

In the backdrop of the above, a two-day National Seminar on “Nation First – CSR – Building Relationships Beyond Funding” was organized by ISRN on 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> July 2014 at IISC, Bangalore. The other partners of the program were Karnataka State Council

for Science & Technology (KSCST), CBR Network and CSR Assist in collaboration with Karnataka State Pollution Control Board, Hutti Gold Mines, Karnataka and Novozymes, Bangalore.

The seminar involved participants from the corporate and VO sector, and the deliberations focused on identifying issues and gaps in CSR, bringing new ideas to bridge the existing gaps and building new relationship based on the mutual trust and understanding developed in the February 2014 meeting. In this regard, the seminar focused on enhancing understanding and exploring new linkages/networks/support systems between the business communities and the civil societies for effective implementation of development projects to develop a strong India.



The multi-objectives in this direction were to sensitize the companies and civil societies about the Companies Act 2013, sharing on replicable good practices on CSR, understanding issues and challenges to achieve inclusive development, and to promote a forum for knowledge building, sharing and networking for the effective implementation of CSR projects.

The seminar was inaugurated by Hon'ble Justice Sri Rama Jois. A digital library on CSR was released by Dr Vaman Acharya, Chairperson, Karnataka State Pollution Control Board. Digital library on CSR contains CSR policies, practices and legislations in India and other countries. Dr A.K. Monnappa, Chairperson, Hutti Gold Mines graced the function as the chief guest. Prof.M.S. Mohan Kumar, Director, KSCST chaired the inaugural session. Dr Vinay Sahasrabuddhe, Chairperson Rambhau Mhalgi Prabodini delivered the keynote address.

Around 160 participants from corporate sector, government departments, Universities, Civil societies participated in the seminar.

Dr. C.S. Kedar, IAS made a presentation on the scope of CSR. Prof Vasanthi Srinivasan, IIM Bangalore presented on CSR a window of new opportunities. Dr Malathi Somaiah, Former faculty IIM, Bangalore highlighted the need for professional management systems for effective implementation of CSR. Sri T. Pradeep, chairperson, Samuha presented the Sustainable development and role of CSR. Dr. Pranjal Goswami from Novozymes presented CSR and corporate concerns. Sri Ravindra Sathe from ISRN presented the scope of ISRN in building effective CSR supported programme to achieve the inclusive and sustainable developments.

Nalini Sampath and Sri Rajagopal from CSR Assist shared the need for good management and support systems for effective implementation of CSR. Sri Pranav Desai, USA and Ms.

Debra Perry, USA shared the global policies and practices in CSR. Smt Deepthi Samanth consultant, research scholar, Syracuse university presented the need for HRD for effective CSR. Good practices in CSR were presented by Karnataka state pollution Control Board and Hutti Gold Mines.



### **National Seminar On CSR for Shreshth Bharat**

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The Companies Act of 2013 came into effect from 1st April 2014. According to the Act, CSR in India will be governed by clause 135, and was applicable to companies with an annual turnover of Rs. 1000 crore and more, or a net worth of Rs. 500 crores and more, or a net profit of Rs. 5 crore or more. The eligible companies need

to spend at least 2% of their average net profit in their previous three years on CSR activities.

While the act came into force, there was lot of non-clarity/ confusion about the various provisions of the Act among the corporate as well as the implementing agencies i.e. the VOs. It is in this context that ISRN the premier CSR network in association with India@ 75 / CII and Governance Now organized a daylong seminar on “CSR for Shreshth Bharat” on 8th October 2014 at Ashok Hotel, New Delhi. The program brought together more than 200 people of different genre working on CSR issues to deliberate on the issues related to the Act.

Chaired by Smt. Nirmala Sitharaman, Hon'ble Minister of State (Independent Charge), Commerce and Industry and Minister of State, Finance & Corporate Affairs, the other dignitaries who addressed the seminar included Dr. Lalitha Kumaramangalam, Chairperson, National Commission for Women; Sh. Chandrajeet Banerjee,

Director General, Confederation of Indian Industry (CII); Dr. Malika Nadda, Co-Convener, ISRN; Sh. Santosh Gupta, CEO, ISRN and Sh. Sanjay Chaturvedi, Co-Convenor, ISRN.

A range of related issues were discussed in the four sessions on:

1. Corporate as Vehicle for Societal Development
2. Together towards Shreshtha Bharat (Relationship building beyond funding)
3. Challenges in CSR Implementation and Importance of Social Audit, and
4. CSR Tourism and Valedictory Session

Dr. Malika Nadda, while explaining the theme of the Seminar emphasized upon the inspiration drawn from the Hon'ble Prime Minister's slogan of “Ek Bharat, Shreshtha Bharat” and highlighted the importance of CSR in strengthening the social, economic, political and cultural fabric of our country.



Sh. Santosh Gupta, while explaining the ISRN network highlighted that networking is not just about connecting people but also connecting organizations with people, people with ideas, and ideas with opportunities.

Sh. Chandrajeet Banerjee stressed upon the need for the industry to join hands in achieving India's development through CSR activities by contributing to the Hon'ble Prime Minister missions such as housing, sanitation, etc.

Dr. Kumaramangalam highlighted the dismal state of gender parity in terms of CSR projects undertaken by the corporates, and requested all the stakeholders to bring gender into CSR

activities. She also emphasized on the toilet construction work on a priority.

Smt. Nirmala Seetharaman explained that the provisions under the CSR act are absolutely well drafted, and defined in terms of the who is eligible, what activities to be undertaken, and other procedures. She also read out the activities that qualify as a CSR activity.

The vote of thanks was presented by Sh. Sanjay Chaturvedi, Co-Convenor, ISRN.

#### **ISRN-Governance Now PSU Award 2014**

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ISRN participated as a CSR partner in ISRN-Governance Now "PSU Award 2014" held on 7<sup>th</sup> November 2014 in New Delhi. The second edition of the prestigious award was dedicated to honour the efforts of Public Sector Undertakings (PSUs) that have been a key to India's overall economic growth. Sh. Kalraj Mishra, Hon'ble Union Minister of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) was the Chief Guest.

Indian PSUs are some of the largest commercial enterprises in India, and

have the unique ability to focus on investing in creation of national assets to maximize long term economic gains rather than short term commercial interest. “PSU Award” is a tribute to such PSUs.

### Award Process

The awards were given Maharatna, Navratana and Mini-Ratana 1 & Mini-Ratana 2 (including other CPSEs) in the categories - Strategic Performance; Human Resource Utilization; Strategic Turnaround; Capital Asset Utilization; Overall Growth and Competitiveness; Information Technology Adoption; Green Initiative; CSR Initiative; Innovation and HR Practices.

ISRN conducted a training program on “Strategies for Resulted Oriented Corporate Social Responsibility” on 18<sup>th</sup> December 2014 at PHD House, Delhi. PHD Chamber of Commerce and Industry (PHDCCI) was the knowledge partner. The program was inaugurated by Sh. Jayant Sinha, Hon’ble Minister of State, Finance, Government of India. The program was organized in the backdrop of a seminar conducted by ISRN on “CSR for Shreshth Bharat”, where the





challenges and gaps in implementation of strategies at corporate sector were discussed extensively, and it was elucidated that training programs for CSR managers is a necessity to bridge the information gap.

The program targeted CSR heads, managers of corporate/ PSUs, CSR consultants, professionals of consultancy firms engaged in CSR project implementation. The program was envisaged to provide advance knowledge and learning for a comprehensive approach to create effective strategies on CSR. The highlights of the program were providing understanding of the participants on the concept and legal framework of CSR, Sustainable development and CSR, Companies Act 2013, its legal implications, implementation strategy for CSR, monitoring and evaluation of CSR projects, social audit, among others.

Certificates were distributed to the participants of the program. The



program was attended by more than 50 participants from corporate.

### **ISRN – Sphere India Round Table Consultation with Corporate on “Strengthening Networks On Disaster Management: Engaging Private Sector for Coordinated Disaster Management”**

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Disaster affects everyone including community, local infrastructure and productive assets. Last decade has seen institutionalization of disaster management involving diverse stakeholders such as government, civil society, media, academic institutions, corporate sector, UN, networks and communities.

Successful Corporate–Humanitarian partnerships have the potential to exploit core competencies of

businesses and humanitarian organizations improving disaster preparedness, response and in some cases, contributing to disaster mitigation.

In the context of the above, the Round Table on “Strengthening Networks on Disaster Management” was organized on 20<sup>th</sup> February 2015 at Sphere India office to attend to the increasing need of involving corporate sector in awareness generation and disaster management through sensitization, training and co-opting of the corporate sector and their nodal bodies in disaster planning process and response mechanisms.

The objectives of the Round Table were:

- To highlight and exchange practices/success stories and cross-learning opportunities of corporate houses and humanitarian actors in disaster management in India.
- To consider possible synergies among companies offering different kinds of humanitarian support.

- To develop a collaborative roadmap to set the agenda and direction for multi-actor communication/collaboration for disaster response and management

Corporate and business can provide financial and nonfinancial support such as goods, human resources, services, and/or knowledge and expertise especially in sectors such as health, construction, logistics, operations, education and communications.

About 50 participants representing corporate networks, corporate representatives, senior officials of humanitarian agencies, and developmental organizations working on DRR attended the Round Table.

The Round Table concluded with an initial roadmap on humanitarian and corporate collaboration for disaster management.

**Dialogue on Role of Voluntary Organizations in Environment Protection & Climate Change**

The Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEFCC), Government of India envisages a greater role for voluntary organizations on the agenda of environment protection and climate change. In this context, the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change in collaboration with Indian Social Responsibility Network (ISRN) organized a half-day **Dialogue on “Role of Voluntary Organizations in Environment Protection and Climate Change”** at Paryavaran Bhawan, New Delhi on 13 April 2015. **Shri Prakash Javadekar, Hon’ble Union Environment Minister, Government of India** chaired the workshop. Other dignitaries present during the workshop were – Shri Shashi Shekhar, Special Secretary, Environment Ministry; Dr Vinay Sahasrabuddhe, Vice Chairperson, ISRN; Dr Medha Somaiya, Convenor, ISRN and Shri Santosh Gupta, CEO, ISRN. Dr Rashid Hassan (CP), Scientist, moderated the workshop. More than 125 participants attended the workshop from 11 different

states, that included member Voluntary Organizations of ISRN and senior officials from the Ministry, among others. The workshop provided an opportunity of direct interface to more than 100 VOs working in the area of environment, forestry and climate change with the Hon’ble Union Environment Minister. The objectives of the Workshop were as follows:



- Inform the voluntary organizations on various schemes and programs of the Ministry
- Sharing of experiences of the Voluntary organizations in the area of environment protection and climate change



VOs who can raise public awareness on the issues on environment, contribute to international debate on environment and climate change can do research, have experience of implementing programs at the grassroots and contribute on the agenda of climate change.

- Carving out a way forward in terms of Ministry's engagement with the voluntary organizations on its mandate

The Hon'ble Minister welcomed the 125 representatives from VOs across eleven states. He also thanked Dr Vinay Sahasrabuddhe, Vice Chairperson, ISRN; Dr Medha Somaiya, Convenor, ISRN and Shri Santosh Gupta, CEO, ISRN in helping the ministry to organize the interactive dialogue with VOs.

He further informed that the ministry envisages working with a large number of VOs on the above agenda. He further informed that the ministry would like to involve

Shri M. Kannan, Economic Advisor to the Environment ministry made a presentation on all the schemes/ programs, its objectives and components that the Ministry is implementing. Taking reference from the National Policy on Forestry that emphasize on participation of civil society and the VOs in improving the quality of the forest cover, Shri Subhash Chandra, DIG, Forests in his presentation envisaged greater role of VOs in the realm of participatory forestry management.

Dr. S. Satpathy, Scientist from the Ministry in his presentation on climate change and its impact defined climate change as a change



of climate which is attributed directly or indirectly to anthropogenic activity that alters the composition of the global



atmosphere and which is in addition to natural climate variability observed over comparable time periods. He also informed about the key messages from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) AR-5 report. He concluded by providing details about the Ministry's Climate Change Action Programme (CCAP). Dr. Vinay Saharsbuddhe in his brief address emphasized on development of e environment as well as environment for development.

Shri Santosh Gupta, CEO, ISRN moderated the session that facilitated sharing of experiences of voluntary organizations from eleven states, as well as direct interaction of voluntary organizations with the Hon'ble Environment Minister. Voluntary organizations from the states of Uttarakhand, Bihar, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh, Jharkhand, Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Manipur, Madhya Pradesh, Delhi, among others shared their experiences with the Hon'ble Environment Minister and the ministry officials.

As an action point arising from the workshop, the Hon'ble Minister shared that VOs working in below mentioned four major domains will



be required by Ministry to work hand in hand and meet the mandate and objectives of MoEFCC.

1. Awareness generation (environmental education, BCC, IEC, community mobilization) programs
2. Project Implementation on environment, climate and forest conservation like capacity building
3. Exclusive work on climate change
4. Environmental research organizations (exclusive work on research)

Shri Santosh Gupta, ISRN thanked the Hon'ble minister and other dignitaries on the dais for their valuable time and contribution to make the workshop a success. Finally, He appealed to the VOs to send their profile highlighting their area of work in the field of environment along with the achievements.

### Membership Increase and Services

Through substantial efforts, ISRN has been able to build a membership of close to 100, including both the VOs and the corporate from 15 states. The indirect outreach of ISRN is with 600 VOs across 28 states.

In terms of membership services ISRN facilitated exposure and training of its members within its own programs as well as providing information about other programs. Similarly, ISRN on behalf of ONGC facilitated participation of VOs in the CSR projects of the company. It also facilitated a direct interface between the Hon'ble Environment Minister and the VOs to discuss how VOs could be involved in the programs of the Ministry.

## Future Roadmap

The year 2014–15 has been a decent beginning for ISRN as an organization. During the year, the focus was on initiate and expand our engagements with our constituencies for future interventions. In this regard, ISRN was able to establish relationship with the corporate, government and the VOs. Specially, it is now being perceived as a strong network with substantial presence and outreach among the VOs. In this context, ISRN's contribution is getting recognition from both the corporate and the government.

Based on the initial work done in 2014–15, ISRN has set few priorities as part of its future plans. Some of the these are:

- Acting as Resource Hub on Information and knowledge in relation to CSR/ government program for the consumption of corporate, government and VOs.

- Expanding membership of ISRN – Given the membership strength of ISRN which is around 100 direct members, there is a need to focus on increasing the membership. This will help in our engagement with corporate and government
- NGO accreditation services : Expanding membership services – One of the strategy for both corporate and VO membership increase is by expanding and improving the membership services. In this regard, ISRN will involve in organizational profiling of members, as well as provide NGO accreditation services for enhanced likelihood of receiving CSR/ government funds.
- Capture, document and disseminate CSR best practices in the form of a



“Compendium on CSR Best Practices in India”

- Organized frequent events like seminar, training program & national level convention on CSR as well as sustainable development issues. At least one is in every quarter.
- Try to get technical study for Ministries and conduct CSR Impact study social audit for PSUs & Corporate.
- Empanelment of ISRN with PSUs & Corporate for facilitation of their CSR activities.
- Transform 50 selected existing government/ private schools into “Saksham” Schools across India of 50 “Saksham School” CSR project in collaboration with PHDCCI.
- Follow up of the ongoing discussion on the Coal India Project, MoEF & CC study, Ministry of Railway project, Ministry of Ganga Rejuvenation & Ministry of Steel.

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
